- Alternatively to the CPRB, can be registered with the Medical Radiation Technologists Board (MRTB) with a scope of practice being Cardiac Ultrasound.

The successful candidate will report to the Clinical Nurse Manager and Lead Sonographer in charge of the department and work along side the other Clinical Cardiac and Respiratory Physiologists, as well as other members of the cardiology team.
